

The Sudan Studies Association

For those reading this newsletter there is probably little need to say why we have come into existence. Indeed, the question is, why has it taken so long for this to happen. Scholarly study of the Sudan has a long history and includes some of the most prominent anthropologists, archeologists, political scientists, 3 geographers, 4 historians, 5 literary critics and many others who have seriously investigated aspects of ancient and modern Sudanese life. Whether as a result of isolation of disciplines, or distance of international travel, we have never been unified as a scholarly community. We cannot claim that the idea of a Sudan Studies Association is unique with us, as many in the scholarly community have had the idea long before the association came into being. What we, the founding members, have done is to simply address this need and coordinate the interests of many in launching the first Sudan Studies Association. This is not conceived of as an individual effort, but very much as a collective enterprise whose time has come. For growth and development to take place you, the readers of this newsletter, Vol. 1, No. 1, have the responsibility of supporting the association and the newsletter through your enthusiasm, your time and effort and your contributions.

The more proximal history of the SSA begins at the 1980 African Studies Association meetings held in Philadelphia, during which an unprecedented three separate panels were held on the Sudan. We circulated a sheet to gather signatures of those who might be interested in forming a Sudan Studies Association. This approach brought us into contact with two of the most stalwart supporters of the idea of the Association, Dr. Constance E. Berkley of Fordham University and Dr. Jay Spaulding of Kean College of New Jersey. Immediately the enthusiasm began to grow. Through Dr. Berkley's close ties with the cultural counsellor's office of the Embassy of the Democratic Republic of the Sudan in Washington we became acquainted with Syd. Osman Hassan Ahmed, who is presently the Cultural Counsellor. We discovered immediately that our ideas had a very close convergence with some of his own about unifying the students and scholars of the Sudan. Syd. Osman had compiled a list of Sudan scholars to which we joined our own list of names for a combined list of about 70 people who were informed about the potential of organizing a Sudan Studies Association.



The SSA is an independent professional society founded in 1981. Hembership is open to scholars, teachers, and students from every country. It exists primarily to facilitate the attempts of a world-wide audience to participate in Sudanese studies and scholarship. The organization welcomes the participation of all who produce the subject of our study. While we hope for a constructive interaction between scholars and students, the SSA as an organization recognizes the primacy of Sudanese scholars in shaping future Sudanese studies. The SSA is published quarterly by the SSA for its members. Membership is for the calender year and available on the following terms: Honarary; \$12.Regular members; \$5. students, retired and unemployed; \$20. Non-profit institutions; 530. profit institutions; \$100. up, sustaining (life) members; \$12. additional will ensure subscription to the quarterly journal, North East African Studies; each issue of which will present several articles concerning Sudanese studies. The SSA also welcomes exchanges with other newslettters and periodicals. As space allows, and if content is appropriate, a limited amount of advertising is allowed. The hospitality of the Political Science Department at George Washington University, coordinated by Ms. Sally Ann Baynard, gave us the location for the founding meeting of the Association on February 7, 1981. Rich discussion took place regarding the purpose, goals and structure of the Association which was duly noted and recorded. An Acting Treasurer was appointed who collected contributions from the 35 people who attended this first meeting and also generous contributions were received from the Ministry of Education in the Sudan and the office of the Cultural Counsellor in Washington, in addition to generous personal contributions from Osman Hassan Ahmed and former Ambassador Salah Hashim. Volunteers were identified to constitute our interim ten-person steering committee.

Since then we have established an interest-bearing account in the name of the <u>Sudan Studies Association</u> and we are in the advanced stages of completing our application for incorporation as an educational, not-for-profit organization. An application for tax-exempt status will also be filed shortly. Meanwhile our Steering Committee is reviewing existing constitutions and is formulating ideas to be incorporated in our own charter. Our current goal is to have a constitution written and prepared for ratification by the founding members in the late spring. Included in this process will be the identification of the positions in the executive structure and nomination and election to these positions.

The work of Dr. Berkely has already resulted in the provision of a Secretariat for the Association at Fordham University/Lincoln Center where our newsletter is being produced. We are now aiming for a quarterly newsletter to which you are all exhorted to contribute and criticize! Negotiations with the African Studies Association have resulted in two panels scheduled to be sponsored by the Sudan Studies Association as well as a place for our business meeting. The ASA meetings were in Bloomington, Ind. this year from October 21-24. We are also aiming toward an early 1982 First Annual Conference of the Sudan Studies Association and details about this will be forthcoming.

In this newsletter and in subsequent issues we want to invite you to join the Association by becoming a dues-paying member. At first this will entitle you to receive the newsletter but we hope and plan to provide other publications in the future; tentative plans include a Directory of Sudan Scholars and a Bibliography of works on the Sudan. We cannot encourage you enough to participate, really to join our high level of enthusiasm in this endeavor. We think that this is an important Association to sustain, but it will only happen and will only grow with your support.

Since our founding we have already received warm greetingsand congratulations from prominent Sudan scholars who were not able to attend the first meeting in Washington; included among the many letters received are greetings from Prof. Mohammed Omer Beshir, Prof. Peter Shinnie, Prof. Robert Collins, Prof. John Voll, Prof. Hasan El-Shamy, Prof. William Arens, Prof. William Adams and others. We need to sustain this momentum! Please join us and join your colleagues in this organized celebration of the vast richness that the ancient history and great diversity of the Sudan can provide.

Sudanese Students in the United States

The total number of Sudanese students in the United States, according to a Directory issued by the Sudan Embassy, Office of Cultural Counsellor in Washington, D.C. in March, 1981, is 723. From this number, 572 are sponsored by the Sudan Government and are engaged in graduate studies covering all relevant professional fields in the Country. The remaining 151 are on their own. However, as the office of the Cultural Counsellor in Washington D.C. is not in a position to keep an updated record of these private students, their numbers may vary upwards or downwards.

Dear Colleagues:

We are in the process of compiling a Bibliography of Nilotic Studies which will be published in the monograph series of the Institut fur Afrikanistik of the University of Cologne. The focus of the Bibliography will be primarily linguistic and will include materials on and in the Nilotic languages as defined by Koehler and Greenberg (i.e. both Tucker and Bryan's Nilotic Proper and Paranilotic). In this Bibliography we hope to be as exhaustive as possible in the following areas:

- (a) Comparative, historical, and typological studies.
- (b) Grammars and grammatical studies of individual languages, both scholarly and pedagogical.

- (c) Dictionaries, vocabularies, and word lists, including travelers' word lists for the last century. (We are also especially interested in publications which give the Nilotic language names of the flora and fauna in the area.)
- (d) Texts of all sorts, including folkloric texts, Bible translations school books and literacy materials.
- (e) Ethnographic studies which include significant lexical material.

We are also considering the inclusion of some general ethnographic and ethnohistorical studies which would be useful for background information and the orientation of the beginning student, but we do not plan to be exhaustive in this area.

We are especially eager to have information about manuscript materials, including field notes and word lists, which their owners might be willing to share with other scholars. We would also like to have information about ephemera of all kinds: locally produced, duplicated teaching materials, school texts, draft versions of scripture portions, and the like.

We would also like to include information about unpublished dissertations of all sorts: B.A. (Honors), M.A., Ph.D. If you know of any such, would you please list them.

One final matter: If you have material in preparation or know of any, would you please list that too. We think that this is important because there are so few of us active in the field that we should try not to duplicate each other's efforts.

The scene is anywhere; a social scientist with a notebook approaches a group of fellow humans. "What is it that you want to know about us?" With this question the tables are turned, and whatever the student may choose to say at that moment or in subsequent writings, it is likely to constitute as much a test of his own vision as an account of his subjects. It is appropriate to begin this series of reviews with a book which not only contains information, but also embodies the authors qualities of perception, wisdom and generosity of spirit.

Wendy James has made it her goal to understand the various small non-Arab ethnic groups of the Sudan-Ethiopia borderlands; the members of one of these communities, the Uduk, constitute the protagonists of 'Kwanim Pa: The Making of the Uduk People (Cambridge: Clarendon Press, 1979).

The weight of history lies heavy upon the Uduk. Like characters in a play by Samuel Beckett, they bear testimony at every turn to the effect that something dreadful and of fundamentally disorienting significance has happened. "We know nothing. All the people have died; we are only a few, only a few children left now." Each of the traditional anthropological tasks, whether recording the myths of origin, delineating the basic features of social structure, or simply

ascertaining an individual's name, leads back into the fiery cataclysm of the nineteenth century when brutal and greedy men with guns roamed the land and the Uduk — those who survived — were reduced to "running about in the bush like antelopes."

The modern Uduk are thus an "intentional community" created during the present centruy, though drawing upon the older cultural traditions of their area. Dr. James emphasizes the institutions through which new members are incorporated into Uduk society, for the self-identity of the group includes the concept of being a remmant of rescued survivors.

The virtues of Kwanim Pa include a determination to conduct intellectual operations within a realm of discourse comprehensible to the Uduk, and the skillful use of translated texts to help convey the qualities of this universe to the non-Uduk reader. Inevitably, this approach sacrifices the insights which might perhaps be gained from the application of a theoretical perspective, and it leaves the reader — quite correctly — with a sense that much more might be said by, and about, the Uduk. May many sequels follow!
